

FIVE FACTS

ABOUT ASHBURTON'S EARLY YEARS

FACT 1

Edward Stocks

Edward Stocks, one of the earliest settlers, arrived in the area in 1850. Stocks bought most of the land that now comprises Ashburton. He ran a successful farm and market garden from his house near present-day Holmesglen Station. Around 1928, his grandsons opened and operated the Ashburton Dairy from Stocks Avenue. They delivered milk to residents by horse and cart for the next 35 years.

FACT 2

The suburb name

The suburb Ashburton took its name from the train station. But there are two sources for its origin.

Edward Stocks used the name 'Ashburton' on his correspondence after the ship he arrived on, Lord Ashburton. Around 1890, the Railway Board tasked City of Camberwell Councillor Dillon with finding a new name for Norwood Railway Station. They considered the station too far from its namesake, Norwood (Toorak) Road. Dillon thought the countryside reminded him of Ashburton Terrace in Cork so he gave the station the name Ashburton. Since Dillon and Stocks knew each other, it's quite possible both stories are true.

FACT 3

The area around

Liston Street to Toorak Road used to be a racecourse.

Known as the Sherwood Park Racecourse, this was a large paddock owned by racing enthusiast, J B Scott. It was used for horse racing from around 1888. Spectators attended the races by catching the train to Camberwell and then taking a pleasant afternoon buggy drive. Mr Scott even rejected an offer of £40,000 for the site. By the 1890s, the Victorian Racing Club decided racing should be centralised around Flemington and the racecourse disappeared.

FACT 4

The steam train

The famous 'Ashy Dasher' steam train was actually really slow.

Until well into the 20th century, Melbourne's trains were much slower than its trams. The 'Ashy Dasher' was so named because it took an hour to get to Camberwell Station. The train from the City to Glen Iris Station also had a sarcastic nickname based on its lack of speediness: 'Darktown Express'.



FACT 5 Continuously played sport

Cricket is the longest continuously played sport in Ashburton. Cricket has been played in the Ashburton area almost since the day it arrived in Melbourne in the 1850s. It was played around Burwood Reserve, at Sherwood Park and in the Ashburton Forest. Anywhere remotely flat and treeless was always a good place to play cricket!

Ashburton is a vibrant, exciting, and growing suburb, and the Alamein Neighbourhood and Learning Centre witnesses characters just as vibrant and exciting everyday. From residents accessing the centre's resources, to its dedicated volunteers, the Alamein community is privileged to be filled with an exciting group of helpful and generous people from many walks of life.

Creating a community unique to Ashburton is no easy task, and yet, with wonderful, approachable, and equally unique people backing the social initiatives, the communities being built everyday are a testament to the Ashburton residents themselves.

Warren strongly believes all communities need more diversity and inclusivity.

Following the pandemic when we were separated more than ever, Warren notes how important social connections are to the psyche of an entire community.

"I think people get complacent in their communities, but I also think now is the time to encourage community and create connections."

Warren is not afraid to show up and participate in ways that get people's attention. This includes riding a bike with a fruit juicer on the back, and wearing an all-pineapple style get up. While the idea of doing anything like this may sound intimidating to others, Warren constantly maintains true showmanship, and always gives it a go with a smile. Any chance to create a new social interaction, with the chance of inspiring joy, Warren is there to facilitate in his unique and wonderfully-Warren way.

HEART OF ASHBURTON URSULA JONES

Ashburton locals may recognise Ursula Jones (Ulla), an active local community member who has become the heart of the Ashburton Community Centre.

Ulla moved from Germany to Melbourne in 1985 with her new Australian husband leaving behind her friends, family, and a long established career in the airline industry.

As anyone who has ever moved cities or countries knows, establishing roots in a new place can be an exhausting and isolating experience. Ulla took to jogging through Caulfield Park to keep herself active, while feeling terribly alone in a foreign country.

With time, life settled into a new rhythm as Ulla found a job with a German company and set about establishing her new home. But she still felt that something very important was missing.

Back in Germany, Ulla had thrived as a P.E. teacher, running exercise classes.

While it was a relief to have a job and the foundations laid for the future, Ulla dearly missed her teaching role. She did the rounds of the nearby gymnasiums and recreation centres, but none were quite what she was looking for.



Her search eventually led her to the Ashburton Community Centre. To Ulla's disappointment, the centre only had one yoga class available in their exercise program. The manager explained regretfully that they had not been able to find an instructor to run exercise classes. Seeing an opportunity, Ulla mentioned that she was a P.E. teacher. The manager replied immediately: "When can you start?"

And so, Ulla found her second home. Thirty years later, Ulla still runs regular classes at the Ashburton Community Centre including a Your Healthy Spine class and Nordic Walking.

Taking the time to understand each person's individual needs, Ulla works with participants to increase mobility after surgery or recover from injuries as well as improving general health and wellbeing.

Ulla provides not only inclusive movement classes but builds vital community connections amongst all her participants.

Ulla's dedication to her profession and her community has not only enriched her life but also the lives of countless participants who benefit from her expertise and enthusiasm.

FINDING A NEW COMMUNITY SINEAD MOONEY

What do you do when your support network is on the other side of the world? You find a community to live in with services that can support you.

This is exactly what Sinead Mooney did when her family chose to move from a small inner-city area to a more family-focused suburb. Sinead is a working mum of three young children. Three years ago Ashburton came up as a suggestion from a friend during a discussion about the best suburbs in Melbourne for raising children.

This discussion resulted in the family moving to Ashburton, and Sinead hasn't regretted the move for a moment. The accessibility to services and the family-friendly vibe made it a perfect match for Sinead and her young family.

When talking about childcare services in the area with other mums two years ago, Sinead was recommended to look into the Craig Family Centre. From the moment Sinead entered the centre she knew it was for her family. Kid friendly, inviting and, importantly, with several long-standing staff members the centre offers the children the stability of familiar carers when their parents are not there.

Sinead started her eldest child in the Joey's Sessional Education Program and was impressed with the variety of age-appropriate



activities on offer to her child.

Sinead enjoyed looking at the log-book detailing what the children have done for the day. Sinead's second child started in the program when they turned two years old and her third child is awaiting to join their siblings once they also have their second birthday in October.

Sinead's second child had some settling in issues however the staff were fantastic, supportive and accommodative with assistance.

"The Craig Family Centre went above and beyond, even adjusting rosters to assist my child." Since starting at the centre two years ago, the family's children have attended both three year old and four year old kindergarten. They have also used the Craig Family Centre's wrap-around care extending the care hours to accommodate Sinead's working hours.

Sinead has been impressed with both the three and four year old kindergarten programs. The same teacher has run both age levels limiting the amount of adjustment her child has had to face.

The centre uses the Storypark online sharing platform, which Sinead finds useful in sharing photos, activities, and experiences her children have at kindergarten with her family overseas. Sinead's favourite aspects of the kindy program are the frequent excursions and parent participation days. The family have also utilised various courses and playgroups within the centre.

One year ago the centre put a call out for a parent to join the committee as a parent representative and Sinead successfully applied to join. Her role as a committee member included providing a parent perspective on any issues, understanding the financial position of the centre, assisting with guidance and support to staff, liaising between the centre and council, and generally ensuring requirements are met. Sinead believes that her committee role is of mutual benefit to both the Craig Family Centre and her family.



The Craig Family Centre incorporates the perspective of parents when considering changes or improvements and Sinead is able to help provide this. As a committee member, Sinead and her family attend all family days and special events run by the centre. They are extremely happy with the services and support they receive from the kind, warm people at the centre.

Sinead hopes to see the Craig Family Centre continue to expand and evolve to support the community needs in the future.

Situated on Ashburton's High Street is an intimate and cosy after-hours retreat for young and old alike, with more to offer than beer alone.

Two Doors Brewing, a two-year old brewery creating beers on-site, is run by Andy, an Ashburton local for over twelve years.

Andy has taken his home-brewing passion to new heights with the establishment of his High Street located brewery.

Andy created Two Doors Brewing to fill the void in Ashburton, a suburb absent of nightlife and a pub. Anyone can come and bear witness to the talent and the thoughtfulness Andy and his team have implored in every decision of their work.

Having originally been a chicken shop for over thirty years, the refurbished pub warmly welcomes customers in an environment that oozes the comforts of your local bar. Familiar faces, an array of high-quality drinks to sample, a menu to match, and the space to enjoy company with friends, Two Doors Brewing is the an underrated place to explore after dark.

Andy, originally from the country, loves the idea of "working in the community vou live in". He created this unique microbrewery concept to facilitate a need he noticed in his community. Being an Ashburton local, Andy says that Ashburton has the similar feel of a small town, where you can often walk down High Street and recognise at least one other person to stop and say hello to. For him, this community attribute made it the perfect place to establish Two Doors Brewing as he felt that the only thing missing was a highquality on-site microbrewery to facilitate togetherness, something that the business has achieved in a way that has exceeded even Andy's initial expectations.

Alongside the ever-successful microbrewery and restaurant, Two Doors Brewing also runs its Community Taps™ Program, where the brewery partners with local enterprises like local schools, kindergartens, sport programs and more, and donates a portion of select beverage sales back into local community activities. This allows Andy to give back to the community he serves and loves. The Community Taps™ Program has proven a beneficial investment back into the local community, in a way that is a testament to the work of Two Doors Brewing.

Tackling the challenge of creating and establishing a business following the pandemic was no easy task, and yet Andy and his team have managed to do just that with such positivity and passion. Reflecting on this challenge, Andy believes he was paid back in spades upon the opening of Two Doors Brewing. The local community has fully embraced the brewery and it is now a well known late-night spot for a good drink and great quality meal.

If you're perusing the beer list, Andy's personal favourite are the darker beers, but whatever your choice, the drinks menu at Two Doors Brewing has been carefully crafted to cater for anyone's taste. In addition to the beer list, including gluten-free beer, there is also a delicious wine list, cocktails and food options.



Not just a brewery, Two Doors Brewing is also a place where locals can witness snippets of each other's lives and share stories worth telling. Two Doors Brewing has transcended a bar, and has now become a wonderful nightly retreat for many Ashburton locals, and the surrounding community. They truly have something for everybody, along with exceptional customer service.
